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

FROM THE MAYOR

Hello Lockport,

Welcome to the Fall Newsletter. It has been a busy time at City Hall these last five months. Since taking office there has been much activity. Bringing new staff up to speed, strategic planning, working with developers, and green lighting a number of infrastructure projects have made for a productive start.

You will see some of these infrastructure projects beginning in the next few weeks. The Division Street Bridge repairs and water main replacements will be the most noticeable. Also, we have selected new engineering firms to serve the city, and they will begin designing the projects that will help clean up our water and foster new development by adding infrastructure to commercially zoned areas throughout the city.

In a related item, we will begin the process of shifting our fiscal year to match the calendar year. Doing so will allow us to begin future road and sidewalk projects in the spring, just after school gets out, instead of the week school starts, like we have now. This is something the City is looking to have in place by 2015.

In addition, we have been working with V3 Engineering and staff to find ways to reconfigure traffic in the downtown and make it more pedestrian friendly. These things take time as they have to go through IDOT, but we are working diligently on these issues and look to have a solid plan soon. We are also working closely with the owners of the distressed buildings in the downtown, so we can turn these eyesores back into businesses that will bring the sort of vitality we are all seeking in our historic district.

Lockport Square, better known to most of us as the Target/Home Depot site off on 159th Street and I-355, is now under contract to be bought and developed. We are working closely with the investors and developers involved, and I have made sure that our city staff has been available for every question and concern as the contract moves forward.

We are also working with developers on attracting quality retail and commercial business to Lockport Square and other sites. I have directed our staff to create new marketing materials for an aggressive outreach. Beginning this month, we will be attending conferences and meeting directly with retail players to let them know that we are an underserved community ready for development. The days of Lockport just hoping development walks into our arms is over. From here on out we will start courting businesses.

Furthermore, we have been looking at ways to build out our many empty housing developments. Between empty lots in neighborhoods to entire undeveloped subdivisions, Lockport has had the lowest housing starts in the area for the last few years. While the economy is much to blame, surrounding communities have seen housing starts jump by reducing building fees. Lockport will soon be competitive as we bring those fees in line with these realities. Not only will this build out our underdeveloped neighborhoods, but new housing starts are of great importance to attracting quality retail.

Lastly, I would like to implement better communication between Lockport government and our residents. The best and most cost effective way is electronically. Bridge closings, road detours, emergency information, events, openings, etc., can be relayed to all in a timely manner with email and text updates. For instance, Culver's is going to the Planning Commission with plans to open on Farrell Road and 159th, and the Lockport Branch of the White Oak Library is now open in their newly renovated building downtown. Included in this newsletter is information on how to sign up for text and e-mail alerts. I strongly encourage you to go to online to www.Lockport.org/connect and sign up so we can keep you informed.

Marketing. It works when it's done right. For too long our city's marketing effort to attract retail and commercial development has been the spider web approach: spin a web and hope someone flies into it. Posting "For Sale" signs on commercial property and waiting for callers is not the answer. Not only have we been limited in the number of prospects with this approach, we've never given the development community a clear indication that we are willing and ready to make deals.

As Mayor, I have directed our Economic Development staff to create aggressive marketing materials that we will take to the market place. The housing boom Lockport experienced five to ten years ago was based on anticipated retail growth that, for a variety of reasons, never followed. As such, the message of the City's new marketing materials is clear: We are an underserved community that will support quality retail, restaurants, and commercial growth, and we are open for business.

That said, while you can have a great product and flawless marketing materials, if you have a lousy sales force, you are not going to close on anything. So, coupled to the fact that Lockport is a great and underserved city with a clear marketing strategy, staff and I will be reaching out on the phone, in person, at retail conferences, etc., to build the necessary relationships to make deals happen.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Code Enforcement

In an attempt to improve the appearance and safety of our neighborhoods throughout the City of Lockport, we would like residents to be aware of certain city ordinances. Unfortunately, neighborhoods within Lockport have had to deal with foreclosed properties in recent years; and this can be a long process, leaving the home vacant and not maintained. However, please be aware that the city can address weeds/grass in excess of eight inches and make sure the home is secure during this process.

Also, the city has passed ordinances in recent years regarding residential parking and the location of refuse/recycling containers. A maximum of five (5) passenger vehicles are allowed on a residential lot when not 100% enclosed in a garage, and vehicles cannot be parked on the grass or block the sidewalk. Furthermore, in regards to refuse/recycling containers, they cannot be stored in front of a home. They must be stored out of public view, either behind a fence or inside a garage.

These are just a few city ordinances to keep in mind to help improve the appearance of our Lockport neighborhoods. Vehicle Stickers

Vehicle stickers for City of Lockport residents are available starting November 1, 2013. Stickers purchased during the period of November 1 through December 31, 2013 are sold at a discounted price of \$18.00 per sticker. Stickers bought from January 1, 2014 through January 31, 2014 will cost \$20.00. These prices are valid for passenger vehicles, motorcycles and pickup trucks (B plates). Stickers for trucks with D plates (and over) are \$73.00 up to December 31, 2013, or \$75.00 if purchased after January 1, 2014; and stickers for Dealer plates are \$15.00. Senior Citizens can receive an additional 50% savings per sticker for up to 2 vehicles.

All cars (owned OR leased) registered to the City of Lockport MUST have valid stickers, even if they are not housed here. Also, according to Ordinance 73.011, all new residents must purchase a vehicle sticker within thirty days of establishing residency. Stickers can be purchased at the City's Water Department located at 222 E. 9th Street, Floor 2, or at the Police Department at 1212 Farrell Road. For your convenience, the Police Department will be open on Saturdays from 8 a.m. until noon, from November 1st thru January 31st. You can also purchase stickers at Corwin's Pharmacy:

Please note, if you do not purchase a vehicle sticker before the deadline of January 31, 2014, the City will impose a penalty of \$20.00 per sticker, which will increase the price per sticker to \$40.00.

Roadway Projects

The City of Lockport Maple, Milne, & Summit Reconstruction Project is currently under construction and scheduled to be completed by Mid-September. This project began this summer in order to bring a storm sewer outflow to Read Street. Read street will be reconstructed in 2015 as part of a federally funded Surface Transportation Project (STP), administered through the Will County Governmental League.

Third Street, from Madison to Muehl, will be under construction beginning early September through Mid-November. This project will include new curb & gutter, storm sewer, paving, sidewalk repair and connections, and landscape restoration.

Hamilton Street, from 10th to 12th and 11th Street, from Hamilton to State (IL-171) will also be under construction beginning in September, and continuing through November. This project will include water main replacement, new curb & gutter, storm sewer, paving, sidewalk repair, paver accents and planters (similar to those on 10th) and landscape restoration.

Two intersections will be under construction this fall, with upgrades including turn lanes and traffic signals. The intersection of 13th & State (IL-171) will begin in September and continue through early summer 2014. This project is a federally funded STP project, which is also being partially funded by the State of Illinois. The intersection of Thornton Street and 9th (IL-7), will also be signalized this fall. This project is being funded by the City of Lockport, with the help of developer contributions from adjacent developments.

The 2013 Resurfacing Project is also starting in September. Streets will be resurfaced in the Whispering Pines Subdivision. All Streets and cul-de-sacs will be resurfaced, with the exception of Douglas Parkway which was completed last year. Also being resurfaced are the Long Bow Creek subdivision, the southern half of the Arrowhead Subdivision, Muehl Street in the Drake Subdivision, Amy Court and Tonelli Trail in the Regency Point subdivision. A portion of Jefferson Street, between 5th & Thornton, will be partially reconstructed with new curb & gutter, storm sewer repairs, and paving.

Several areas of town were crack sealed this summer, which helps to preserve pavement that is still in good condition. The sidewalk program will also be

completed by mid-September. If you have sidewalk repair requests, they may be submitted any time through the City's Service Request System (E-GOV), available on the City's website. However, the program is currently closed until next summer.

There are a couple of projects in the works already for next year's construction season. 2014 will bring the Garfield Street Reconstruction Project. Garfield Street will be reconstructed, from 9th (IL-7) to Division Street. This project will include new curb & gutter, storm Sewer, paving, sidewalk repair and connections, and landscape restoration. This project is also part of a federally funded Surface Transportation Project (STP), administered through the Will County Governmental League.

2014 will also bring the reconstruction of 10th Street, from Hamilton to Garfield. This project will include water main replacement, new curb & gutter, storm sewer, paving, sidewalk repair and connections, and landscape restoration. An open house will be held sometime this winter, to give affected residents an opportunity to view preliminary plans and voice any comments and / or concerns.

2013 Leaf Program Begins

Fall is Here – Un-be-LEAVE-able!!!

As we say goodbye to summer and welcome the brilliant colors of fall, we must prepare for the dilemma that accompanies the season...**what do we do with our leaves???** Don't fret. The Leaf Pick-up Program begins in mid-October and will run until December 6th, weather permitting. Please note, Waste Management will pick up your kraft bags full of leaves on your garbage day at no additional charge through the week of November 25th. **NO** sticker is needed, provided the bag is filled with leaves only. If you'd prefer to take advantage of the Public Works Leaf Program, **please be patient** as it is extremely difficult to determine when we will be in your area. Leaves that are placed along the parkway will be picked up as quickly as possible. Please **DO NOT** put leaves in the street or in the curb/gutter, as it will create drainage problems for you and your neighbors. The truck will follow a specific route for safety purposes, as well as efficiency, so we cannot make special trips to any specific address. Also note, the machine can only pick up leaves. If a pile of leaves is mixed with branches, it will not be picked up.

Parkway Trees

The City recently completed a survey of all the parkway trees within the City limits. We will be starting to remove the dead Ash trees that have been effected by the Emerald Ash Borer. At this time, we discourage planting in the parkway until a new list of "acceptable" trees is available. As they become available, updates will be posted on the website at: www.lockport.org.



Snow Removal Plan

The City has established a priority plowing system to help traffic move as efficiently and as safe as possible. Priority One streets are those that are main streets, including those in subdivisions, roads that link arterials, and those streets with schools located on them. Priority Two streets are minor residential, side streets, and those cul-de-sacs with steep inclines and/or sharp curves. Priority Three streets include dead ends, cul-de-sacs and alleys. There are a number of roads within the city that are plowed and salted by the Illinois Department of Transportation, i.e., Route 171 (State Street/ Archer Avenue), Route 53 (Broadway), and Route 7 (159th Street/9th Street), including the high level bridge. Will County plows Division Street east of Briggs and Briggs Street south of Division. Also, as a reminder, City Ordinance 70.27 states, "no person shall park any vehicle upon public streets at any time after snow begins to fall and for a period of eight hours after snow stops falling on the streets and public parking lots. If the snow on the street exceeds two inches in depth, the parking prohibition shall continue until snow removal operations are complete."

Wondering what to do with your branches?

Please remember, since September 1, 2011, the City's policy is to pick up branches/brush ONLY after SEVERE weather. Please take advantage of the Yard Waste Program included in your Waste Management service. Yard waste pick-up started April 1st and will run through the week ending November 30th.

In order for Waste Management to pick up your branches, they must be contained in a kraft bag (no sticker necessary) or bundled. Branch bundles must:

- Be no more than 4 feet in length
- Be no more than 5 inches in diameter
- Weigh no more than 50 pounds
- Be securely tied w/string or twine

Unbundled branches will NOT be accepted.

Residents also have the option of renting a 96-gallon yard waste cart for \$2.00 per month with a 1-year minimum rental agreement. For more information please call (815) 838-0549 option 3.

Rented totes must stay within property

It is the city's policy that all garbage, recycling, and yard waste totes MUST stay with the property, unless you purchased them outright from Waste Management. You cannot take the rented totes with you when you move! If you are unsure, please call the Water Department.



Emergency contact info

To report an after-hours emergency for Public Works, such as a water leak or main break, please call **WESCOM** at **815-838-2131**. (Normal business hours for Public Works are Monday through Friday 7:00 am to 3:30 pm).

How can you recycle electronic items?

The Will County Land Use Department has a container available at the City of Lockport Public Works facility for residents to dispose of electronic items. This container is self serve Monday – Friday 7:00am to 3:00pm and is located at 17112 S. Prime Blvd., just off of Division St. (167th Street) between Gougar and Cedar Road. There are also 2 recycle containers available for mixed recyclables such as glass, paper, cardboard, plastic, etc., for residents to use. Please note, these are for residential use only. We do NOT accept any hazardous materials such as paint, batteries, or light bulbs.

METER READING REGULATIONS

Please know, Ordinance 50.30, "Electronic Meter Reading Regulations", states whenever the city has been unable to obtain an inside reading for billing, it will show as an estimated reading. Your bill should always say "ACTUAL". In order to promote accurate billing, it is the policy of the city to require inside readings or to have those readings collected electronically of all metered properties. Estimated bills do not constitute an inside reading. If you are not metered this does not pertain to you.

If your bill shows an estimated reading or you are unsure, please call the Water Department at (815) 838-0549 option 3.

How to check if you have a water leak

Is your usage on your water bill significantly higher than previous months and you are concerned you may have a leak? If so, do the following:

Take a meter reading before going to bed and then again in the morning. In theory, this reading should be the same. If not, then:



- Check for running toilets
- Check for leaky faucets (inside & outside)
- Check Ice cube maker
- Check humidifier that is hooked up to your furnace

FALL HYDRANT FLUSHING

Hydrant flushing is done each spring and fall. The Fall Program is scheduled to run mid-September through the end of November.

CHECK YOUR CHECK PLEASE

Due to the unusual amount of issues with checks written to the city for payment for water/sewer/garbage service, the bank has been rejecting checks. Prior to mailing your payment, or dropping it off at City Hall, please do the following:

- ✓ Make sure your signature is on the check
- ✓ Make sure to include the legal written amount and the numerical dollar amount
- ✓ Make sure the date is included on the check

EXTENDED VACATION TURN-OFF REQUEST

If you are planning on taking a long vacation or leave out of town for an extended period of time and would like your water/sewer/garbage service temporarily turned off, you must complete a request form and submit it to the Water Department prior to the turn-off period. The city has always honored these requests verbally in the past, but we are now imposing the mandatory requirement of completing and signing a form.

Direct Debit Program

Pay your Water/Sewer/Garbage bill on time every time with our **Direct Debit Program**.

Advantages of the automatic payment plan include:

Direct Debit Program to Pay Water/Sewer/Garbage Bills

Are you tired of mailing in your monthly water/sewer/garbage bill payments, or driving to City Hall to make your payment? Then you should enroll in the City of Lockport's ACH Direct Debit Program. The City of Lockport offers this program at NO charge.

This program will allow utility customers to provide the City with a checking account number, in which the resident's utility bill will be automatically paid in full each month. Those who sign up for this program will continue to receive their utility bill, but will no longer have to send in or drop off payments. In addition, this program will be available for free to all utility customers of the City.
